Close Knit

Visual Artist Claire Hignett has been working with DIY Artists and participants who have printed self-portraits and illustrated their memories and their favourite moments at DIY on fabric. These elements have brought together by Claire to create a textile piece that celebrates the history and identity of DIY.

The centre of the piece is split into five sections that reflect 4 DIY shows – Following the Thread, Give me Space, Following Patient 36 and Hanging by a Thread – and DIY's activities during Lockdown. A border of triangles created by DIY's Thursday Visual Arts Group forms a series of directional arrows around the piece. Cubes standing on the mat represent members of the company. They are part of the "game" which is yet to be invented by DIY members.



Hilary Easter Jones has been working alongside the company to create a film that documents the process of creating the Close Knit Textile piece, which will also be shown at the event.







30 Portraits

'30 Portraits' is a photography exhibition created by photographer Audrey Albert working with DIY Artists and Leaders. Audrey held a photo shoot with each member to create their individual portrait which represents their unique personality and passions.

Picking up the Threads

Textile Piece & Film

Over 10 years ago, during 2013 and 2014, DIY members developed a textiles project with Claire Hignett called "Picking up the Threads" which looked back at the history of DIY Theatre Company. Each person that had been involved in the company up to 2014 is represented by a different thread and together they form a knitted timeline which maps the history of the company. The hanging was on display in the Angel Centre, Salford for 10 years.

A film crew of DIY members worked with Hilary Easter-Jones to create a film documenting the process of making the textile hanging. We will be showing this film as part of the Close Knit event.



Back Together and Together in our Separateness

Together in Our Separateness and Back Together and are complementary artworks about the Covid pandemic.

Together in Our Separateness was made as a response to Claire's experience of the Covid-19 lockdown, and her relationship with DIY. Back Together is a piece of participatory art created by members of DIY working with Claire. When Covid restrictions were relaxed, company members and freelance artists met with Claire in Peel Park. DIY members and staff were invited to share what it meant to them to meet in person after such a long period of separateness.
